CONDITIONALS: IF CLAUSES (Types 0, 1, 2, 3 & Mixed)

Zero Conditional

Structure used to talk about **general truths**, or **scientific facts**, things which always happen under certain conditions.

If + simple present	. simple present
	,p.o p. ooo

Ex:

If you steal, you go to jail.

Phosphorus burns if you expose it to air.

If you walk under the rain, you get wet. You get wet if you walk under the rain.

First Conditional

Structure used to talk about **possible present** or **future** situations (likely to happen) and their consequences.

If + simple present/present	, will	+ base
continuous	can / may	form
	imperative	

Ex:

If I get the money, I will invest it.

If I save enough money this year, I will go to Buenos Aires.

If you come to classes, you will learn a lot.
You will learn a lot if you come to classes.

If you want to lose weight, eat healthier

, do exercise.

, don't eat fast food.

Don't eat fast food if you want to lose weight.

Second Conditional

Structure used to talk about **hypothetical**, **imaginary**, sometimes **impossible** situations in the **present** or in the **future** and their consequences.

If + simple past / past	, would	+ base
continuous	could / might	form

Ex:

If I had the money, I would buy this car.

If I were you, I wouldn't bet every weekend

If I won the lottery, I'd buy a big house for my family. I'd buy a big house for my family if I won the lottery.

BUT → The verb to be is always different, it is special.

If I were / was sportier, I'd go to the gym every day.

In the expression "If I were you, I'd..." to give advice, you **MUST** use were.

If I were you, I would (I'd) start preparing the TOEFL from the very beginning.

Third Conditional

Structure used to talk about unreal, imaginary, hypothetical situations in the past and their consequences. In other words, it is used to talk about things which **DID NOT HAPPEN** in the past. Therefore, they are impossible.

If + past perfect	, would	+ have + past participle
simple/continuous	could / might	

Real Situation in the past:

Peter didn't study for a test, so he failed it.

Third Conditional:

If Peter had studied more, he would have passed the test. Peter wouldn't have failed the test if he had studied more.

Mixed Conditional

Structure used to **mix second and third conditional**. When the idea mixes a **hypothetical situation in the past with a present or future consequence**.

Real Situation:

Teacher: Please Peter, wake up. We are in class.

Peter: Sorry, I went to bed too late.

Teacher: Well, if you hadn't gone to bed so late, you wouldn't be so tired.

(another option) You could be more awake if you had gone to bed earlier last night.

Be careful with 'd.

'd = would / had

'd + verb base form = would → I'd go

'd + verb past participle = had → I'd gone
